

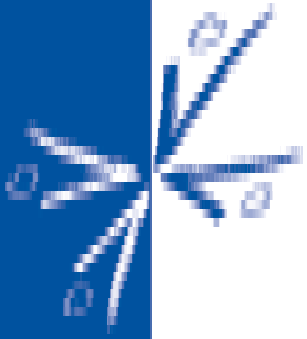

About the Institute

Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps, a non-profit organization, works to raise awareness and educate the people of Saskatchewan about the prevention of handicapping conditions in children. Formed in 1980, the Prevention Institute is the only one of its kind in Canada.

What the Institute Does

The Prevention Institute provides:

- print and audio visual resources based on the most recent information,
- educational opportunities to increase knowledge of prevention issues,
- tools to community groups that will assist in the development of prevention programs,
- networking and partnering projects that further prevention efforts,
- links with community, non-profit and government organizations to ensure a coordinated approach to prevention programming

Primary Prevention

The Prevention Institute focuses on primary prevention. Primary prevention aims to prevent disabling conditions from occurring. Eating well and avoiding drugs, tobacco and alcohol during pregnancy are ways a woman can protect her unborn baby. Using protective equipment such as helmets and child car seats may prevent a brain injury. Learning about positive parenting strategies can help to avoid neglect and abuse of children. There are many other preventative measures. However, it is important to recognize that not all disabilities can be prevented. Preventing disabilities is an individual and societal responsibility.

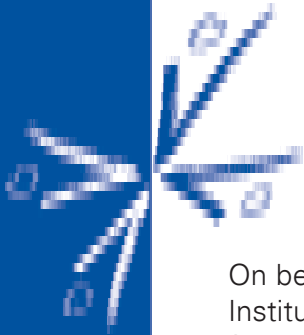

Alcohol, Tobacco and Drugs

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps coordinates and administers the fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) prevention project funded by the Government of Saskatchewan. Program initiatives have focused on: increasing awareness, providing education and training, supporting community development initiatives, distributing educational resources and providing provincial coordination.

Awareness and Education

September 9, 2000 was the second annual International FAS Awareness Day. Events to raise awareness regarding the prevention of fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) were planned in communities across Saskatchewan. As well, November 12- 18, 2000 was National Alcohol and Drug Awareness Week. The Prevention Institute distributed information, including a public service announcement on the prevention of FAS, to all television and radio stations in the province. The "Let's Find a Solution" radio and television ads aired during the months of September, November, December and March. The campaign, funded by the Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority, covered all of Saskatchewan.

The Prevention Institute provides awareness presentations on FAS to communities, agencies and organizations, upon request. On average, staff delivered 5 presentations per month in 2000/01.

Saskatchewan Education once again partnered with the Prevention Institute to deliver presentations on FAS to educators throughout the province. Arrangements for these presentations were made through Saskatchewan Education. Twenty workshops were held from April 1, 2000 to March 31, 2001. The hosting schools also invited other professionals and parents within their communities to attend.

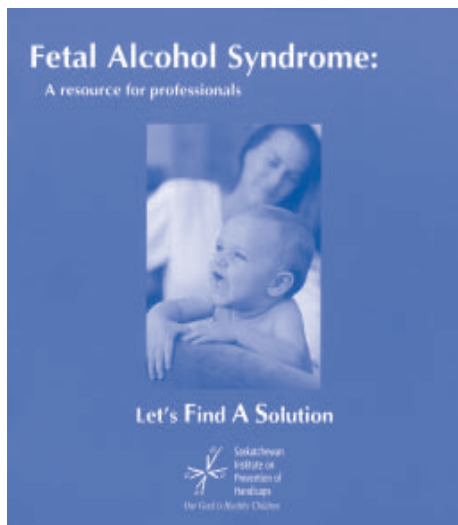
On March 3, 2001, over 80 physicians, psychologists and other health care professionals attended "Fetal Alcohol Syndrome - A Practical Approach," a one-day symposium hosted by the Prevention Institute, in partnership with the Saskatchewan Government, Prairie Northern FAS Partnership and University of Saskatchewan Continuing Medical Education. The symposium increased understanding of issues relating to recognition, diagnosis and assessment of FAS and other alcohol related disorders among participants.

Community Development

Currently, there are four regional FAS Committees in Saskatchewan, located in Prince Albert, La Ronge, North Battleford and Regina. In 2000/01, the Prevention Institute provided grants to support their work in addressing the prevention and management of FAS within their communities.

Resources and Information

The Prevention Institute distributes brochures, fact sheets, posters and a resource kit to the general public, professionals and families upon request. The booklet *Fetal Alcohol Syndrome: a resource for professionals* was produced to provide basic information about the effects of prenatal exposure to alcohol, which will lead to a better understanding of the characteristics and behaviour of individuals with FAS.



Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Coordinating Committee

The Saskatchewan FAS Coordinating Committee meets three times a year to maximize the coordination of prevention and intervention efforts in the area of fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) and partial fetal alcohol syndrome (pFAS) through increased collaboration of professionals, family and community organizations. This committee has grown to 23 member agencies and plays an important role in

providing opportunities for sharing of information, expertise and resources. The Prevention Institute coordinates the activities of this committee.

Prairie Northern FAS Partnership

The Prevention Institute is one of three Saskatchewan members on the Prairie Northern FAS Partnership. The partnership is an alliance of the Prairie Provinces and Territories committed to the development, promotion and coordination of a comprehensive approach on the prevention of FAS, as well as the intervention, care and support of individuals affected by FAS. Through this initiative, the provincial/territorial partners are able to learn from one another, and share expertise and resource materials.

The Prevention Institute, in consultation with a provincial steering committee and Continuing Nursing Education, are working to promote and coordinate the *Saskatchewan 2001 Prairie Northern Conference on Fetal Alcohol Syndrome* to be held in Saskatoon in the spring of 2001. The conference will examine issues and challenges of FAS faced by youth, families and communities.

Childhood injuries



Acquired Brain Injury Partnership

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps has secured funding through the Acquired Brain Injury Partnership Project until 2004. The project is funded by Saskatchewan Government Insurance and administered by Saskatchewan Health. This project seeks to enhance the care and rehabilitation of individuals with acquired brain injury as well as to raise awareness and develop programs to prevent acquired brain injury in Saskatchewan. The Prevention Institute works specifically to raise awareness and deliver education about the prevention of acquired brain injury among children in three main areas: child passenger safety, playground safety, and bicycle safety.

Child Passenger Safety Provincial

The Child Passenger Safety Train the Trainer program offered by the Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps continues to be a very successful strategy in educating parents and caregivers about the proper use and installation of child restraints in vehicles. Train the Trainer workshops have been held on an annual basis since 1998, resulting in a number of qualified trainers being located throughout the province.

The Train the Trainer program is an integral component of the overall child passenger safety strategy in Saskatchewan by providing qualified trainers throughout the province who educate parents and professionals on child passenger safety. The Prevention

Institute works collaboratively with Saskatchewan Government Insurance, Saskatchewan Safety Council, Transportation Centre at the University of Saskatchewan, and many health districts and local agencies in this province-wide strategy.

The Prevention Institute also provides ongoing education for Child Passenger Safety Trainers by organizing annual training refreshers and distributing a newsletter to keep the trainers apprised of current knowledge.

Several new child passenger safety resources were developed, including:

- a series of three information sheets representing the three stages of child car seats including rear-facing infant, forward-facing child, and booster seats
- a revised version of Mooshum's Gift, a video featuring an Aboriginal family learning to properly install a child car seat
- a project guide to communities interested in implementing child passenger safety initiatives.

Child Passenger Safety National

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps continued to be a representative on the Canadian Coalition on Child Passenger Safety in 2000. At a planning meeting in November 2000, the framework of the organization changed significantly. The organization is now called the Canadian Child Passenger Safety Network. The development of the National Child Passenger Train the Trainer program will continue under the Network within a special subcommittee.

Playground Safety

In March 2000, the Prevention Institute hosted a networking meeting of playground safety stakeholders in Saskatchewan. The intent of the meeting was for the agencies working in the area of playground safety to network and share information as well as to introduce a project the Prevention Institute was working on. In partnership with Saskatoon District Health Public Health Services and the Saskatoon and District Safety Council, the Prevention Institute is developing the Playground Safety Workshop to educate local communities on the Canadian Standards Association's guideline on playground safety. The one-day workshop combines a mix of classroom and hands-on instruction, with participants receiving a comprehensive manual. This unique strategy will be made available throughout Saskatchewan under a community development framework.

Bicycle Safety

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps continues to serve as lead agency for the Saskatchewan Coalition on Bicycle Safety. The emphasis of the Coalition is two-fold: providing education on the various aspects of bicycle safety and advocating for more comprehensive bicycle legislation in Saskatchewan. In spring 2000, the Coalition offered free training workshops to several communities across the province providing information and tools to educators, parents, and community leaders. Topics covered included helmet use, bicycle maintenance, and riding skills.

Canadian Centres for Injury Prevention and Control

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps participates in the Canadian Centres for Injury Prevention and Control (CCCIPC), a collective of provincial centres across Canada, which discusses and acts on common challenges and joint ventures to reduce and control injuries and to enhance the safety of the population. The major effort of this group in the 2000 – 2001 period has been to develop a national curriculum on injury prevention and control that will be delivered to injury control practitioners.

Economic Burden of Unintentional Injury in Saskatchewan

The Prevention Institute is partnering with Saskatchewan Health and SmartRisk in the development of a report entitled, *The Economic Burden of Unintentional Injury in Saskatchewan*. It is anticipated that this report will be released in the next fiscal year.

Brain Awareness Week (March 12 – 18, 2001)

The Saskatchewan Neuroscientists Association organize Brain Awareness Week on an annual basis. The Prevention Institute is an active participant in this week. This year, the Prevention Institute developed a public service announcement, "Gotta Brain? Get a Helmet." As well, the Prevention Institute helped to plan a public lecture, promoted helmets at a Western Hockey League game, and had a display and helmet fitting booth at the Brain Show which was held at the end of the week.



Neglect and Abuse

Prevention of Child Abuse Project

SaskTel Partnership

In September 1999, SaskTel and the Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps entered into a partnership to produce a province-wide public awareness campaign to reinforce positive parenting and the need for community support to prevent child abuse and neglect.

Media Campaign

- The media campaign included the development of television and radio commercials and posters. The theme for the media campaign was "Listen with your Heart." Approximately 400 poster sets have been distributed to agencies and communities such as; Health Districts, Tribal Councils and First Nations communities. The commercials ran during the months of May and October of 2000.
- Bill inserts for the SaskTel telephone bills were developed by the Prevention Institute and SaskTel. The inserts had a direct impact on the Healthy Parenting Home Study Program, resulting in increased inquiries about the program and subsequent enrolments.

SaskTel Mobility

- In June 2000, SaskTel Mobility Customer Service Representatives provided financial support to the program, which supported the printing of the Healthy Parenting Home Study brochures, and print advertising.

Web Site

- In October 2000, the Healthy Parenting Home Study Program was placed on the Internet. There have been 70 registrations for the program on-line.

Healthy Parenting Home Study Program

The Healthy Parenting Home Study Program continues to grow. From April 1, 2000 to March 31, 2001, 493 participants registered for the program. Since the onset of the program in October 1998 there have been 1,475 registrants.

The program primarily serves parents who prefer to learn at home. However, there has been a recent increase in participants from group settings. At the present time, eight groups are taking the program including high school life skills programs, young parent support groups, and a group at a correctional centre. Registrants from the group settings made up 33% of all participants from September 2000 to March 2001.

An evaluation of the Healthy Parenting Home Study Program was completed in November 2000 and program feedback forms were sent to all registrants who completed the program. The average score for program satisfaction was 4.5, with 5 being very satisfied.

- 97.9% stated that they would like to see a Home Study Program developed for school-aged children.
- 95.6% expressed an interest in a program developed for adolescents.
- 49.6% of those who started, completed the program.

Shaken Baby Syndrome

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps is the lead agency for the development of a national strategy on shaken baby syndrome. Health Canada, the Canadian Institute of Child Health and the Canadian Paediatric Society are all partners in the national strategy development.

The national strategy includes the development of three components:

- a national statement on shaken baby syndrome,
- multidisciplinary guidelines on the identification, investigation and management of shaken baby syndrome cases,
- and a communication network for professionals working in the area of shaken baby syndrome.

Prevention Institute staff wrote a comprehensive background paper upon which the national statement is based.

A regional committee from Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, is developing the first draft of the multidisciplinary guidelines. These guidelines will be reviewed on a national basis and will be discussed at the Second Canadian Conference on Shaken Baby Syndrome to be held in November 2001.

A national communication network on shaken baby syndrome is being established. The plan is to develop a web site identifying experts in the many facets of shaken baby syndrome from across the country who are willing to act as resource people either by being contacted directly or through the web site.

Nobody's Perfect

Nobody's Perfect is a parent education program for parents of children from birth to age five.

Sixty-four facilitators were trained during the past year. Six training sessions were held in La Ronge, Prince Albert, North Battleford, Saskatoon and Regina.

The revised Nobody's Perfect Facilitator's Guide was introduced to trainers by a master trainer from British Columbia at a two-day workshop in November.

Yearly facilitator updates were introduced this year as an enhancement to the basic training program. Newly trained facilitators and active facilitators were eligible for training support. Regional facilitator updates were held in Regina and North Battleford. This new initiative was one of the recommendations of the Nobody's Perfect Parenting Program Status Report, 1999-2000. The focus of this year's update was the newly revised Facilitator Guide.

Twenty-seven community grants were distributed to Nobody's Perfect programs throughout Saskatchewan. The grants were used to support transportation, childcare and snacks to program participants.

Networking with other parenting committees is an important part of enhancing the profile of the Nobody's Perfect program. The Prevention Institute has representation on the Provincial Parenting Education Committee and the Saskatoon Parenting Education Committee.

Reproductive Health



Infant Mortality

The Saskatchewan Infant Mortality Symposium was planned and promoted by the Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps in consultation with Saskatchewan Health and a Scientific Advisory Committee. The Symposium was held November 1-3, 2000 and proved to be an important first step in consulting with interested individuals. Participants came from diverse backgrounds with an interest in women's reproductive health and children's wellbeing. A proceedings document compiling the events of the Symposium was written by the Institute staff.

Maternal Serum Screening

Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps has worked with Saskatchewan Health to coordinate discussions about maternal serum screening (a prenatal blood test available in several other Canadian provinces). Committees made up of individuals representing a wide variety of stakeholders have worked to plan for the introduction of maternal serum screening in the province. The Institute, in consultation with the committees, has drafted education materials to be used with professionals and the public. Introduction of maternal serum screening in the province is expected in 2001 pending further provincial discussion.

The Advisory Committee on Family Planning to the Minister of Health

Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps has been in partnership with Saskatchewan Health since 1992 in the administration of the Advisory Committee on Family Planning to the Minister of Health. The Committee was recently renewed until 2006.

Since 1992, the major initiatives of the Advisory Committee on Family Planning include the creation of teen wellness centres, the hosting of provincial conferences and workshops, and the dissemination of research information.

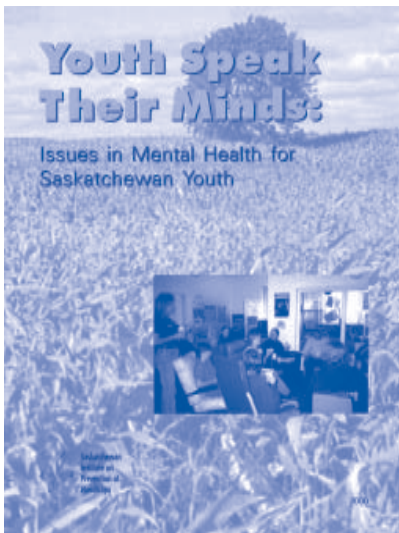
In the spring of 2000, two new teen wellness centres, in LaLoche and LaRonge, celebrated grand openings. There are now a total of nine centres throughout the province. The other centres are located in Prince Albert, Lashburn, Saskatoon, Biggar, Moose Jaw, Regina, and Swift Current.

In August 2000, a workshop entitled *Teaching about Sexual and Reproductive Health* was held. Well-known and respected sexual and reproductive health educators were invited to facilitate the two-day workshop in Regina to an audience of public health nurses and classroom educators.

An evaluation of the nine teen wellness centre has entered its preliminary stages. An external evaluator has been hired and a plan drafted. The intent of the evaluation is to provide the teen wellness centres with information to further improve their programming, and also to share the practices of their centres with others.

Youth Speak their Minds: Issues in Mental Health for Saskatchewan Youth was released in the summer of 2000. This report follows *Youth Speak Out: Attitudes and Behaviours Related to Youth at Risk in Saskatchewan* which was released in 1999. Both reports

Data in this report are a subset of the findings of the Saskatchewan Youth Attitudes Survey dealing with sexual activity and knowledge, smoking, drug and alcohol use, victimization,





Prevention Strategies

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps uses all means possible to ensure that prevention messages reach as large a target audience as possible. Prevention strategies are activities undertaken by the Prevention Institute to reach this objective. Strategies include community education, public relations and communications, research, and networking and collaborating with community groups, other non-profit organizations and government. All activities assist in providing a coordinated provincial approach to prevention programming in Saskatchewan.

Communications

The Saskatchewan Institute on Prevention of Handicaps' Board of Directors selected a new logo in July of 2000 in order to implement an updated image for the Institute. The previous logo had been used, with slight variations, since the Institute was formed in 1980.

The Prevention Institute's new logo is composed of four elements which unite to form a whole. Each of the four elements represents the healthy growth of a child, illustrated by a radiating movement outward, which, in turn, can be likened to a flower. The colours of the logo, red and blue, were chosen for their strength and vitality.

A great deal of work has been done over the last year to update the corporate materials and institute resources to implement the new logo. The website has also undergone changes and is constantly evolving to reflect the progressive work done at the Institute.

The profile of the Prevention Institute was raised by the media coverage of several prevention issues throughout the past year. Topics receiving provincial media attention this year included shaken baby syndrome, fetal alcohol syndrome and infant mortality.

Education

The Prevention Institute promotes its prevention messages through a variety of community education programs. Presentations and displays at professional and public events continue to be a significant component of the Prevention Institute's work.

Requests from across the province are made for presentations about the Prevention Institute and its educational programs. This year, presentations have focused on shaken baby syndrome, injury prevention, child passenger safety, and fetal alcohol syndrome. Recognition for the work of the Prevention Institute as a valuable source of current prevention information continues to grow.



Information Services

The Prevention Institute continues to distribute print and audio-visual resources throughout the province.

- **90%** of Institute materials were developed in house
- **151,322** individual pieces of resource material were distributed over the last year
- **50%** were requests for information
- **36%** were provincial and national mailouts

The remaining items distributed were to individuals and agencies across Saskatchewan through displays, presentations and conferences.

The Prevention Institute has continued to make strides in distributing prevention information to northern Saskatchewan communities.

- **35%** of resources were distributed to Saskatoon and north.
- **16%** were distributed south of Saskatoon
- **16%** were sent out of province
- **33%** were distributed province-wide

The audio-visual lending library continues to be a valuable resource and is composed of 121 videos and slide presentations. Over the past year, prevention videos were borrowed 407 times. Videos pertaining to FAS and sexual and reproductive health were in highest demand.

Community

Development

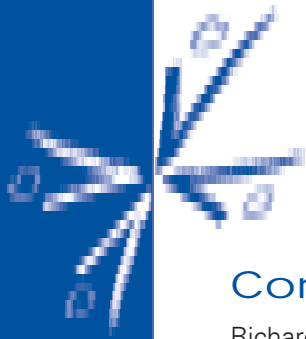
Community Action Program for Children (capc) -Community Development & Networking Project

The Community Development (CD) and Networking Project began in the spring of 1994 and is funded until March 2003. The project involves working with Saskatchewan's non-aboriginal communities in supporting programs for children, aged birth to six years, who are at risk for poor health outcomes.

The CD Project Consultant's role in working with project staff, sponsors and community members includes:

- sharing information and ideas for programming;
- assisting with proposal writing;
- linking project staff with other agencies and resources;
- assisting with problem solving;
- supporting board development; and,
- developing program evaluation plans.

Thirty-four project visits have been made to the 14 projects assigned to the CD Project Consultant over the past year. The CD Project Consultant also works collaboratively with Health Canada staff and other community developers to provide support to other projects funded by the Community Action Program for Children (CAPC). An example of this extended support was the coordination of the provincial Networking Workshop attended by approximately 65 CAPC project staff throughout Saskatchewan.

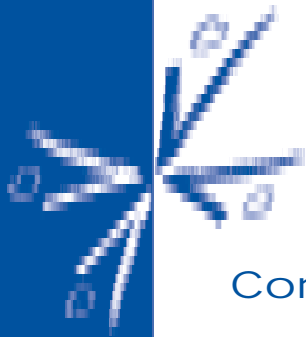
